This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents or carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education.

Part A: Curriculum music

This is about what we teach in lesson time, how much time is spent teaching music and any music qualifications or awards that pupils can achieve.

At St Joseph's we are passionate about providing all children with a high-quality music education, regardless of gender, socio-economic status and special educational needs.

As a school, we work closely with Stockport Music Service to provide our core music curriculum throughout the school.

In EYFS children are taught from Stockport Music Service's bespoke curriculum which is informed by the model music curriculum. In addition, children in Early Years also learn and sing a variety of songs and nursery rhymes through other curriculum areas.

In Key Stage 1 and 2, every child receives weekly instrumental tuition for 30 minutes, delivered by a music specialist from Stockport Music Service. This academic year violin is taught for the second consecutive year prior to this the children have learned to play the ukulele. Children also take part in weekly whole class listening and appraisal exercises for 15 minutes, which expose children to a range of genres and composers

throughout different musical periods. In addition, three supplementary mini units of composition, and three performance units throughout the year also ensure full national curriculum coverage is achieved. These additional listening units are taken from Stockport Music Service's bespoke curriculum and the composition units are taken from Kapow.

Part B: Co-curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

At St Joseph's, we have a school choir which is made up of children from Year 2 to Year 6. The choir rehearse each week for 30 minutes and is supported by a volunteer from the school community. The school choir takes part in local events and performances, performing each week at Stockport Junior Carol Festival and Stockport Music Service's Spring event. Our school choir also performs at school liturgies, parish celebrations and school services such as the Christmas Service.

Children have the opportunity to access recorder tuition by joining the school recorder club, led by the music lead. This club is provided without cost to parents and all children are eligible to attend. The school provides instruments and music to children attending the club.

Through the PSHE curriculum and celebration of themed days, all children have taken part in musical workshops including gospel singing and African drumming.

The school regularly advertises instrumental tuition and choral opportunities within the local community, particularly those run by our local music hub.

Part C: Musical experiences

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.

Twice weekly, the whole school gather together and children have the opportunity to sing in unison.

There are many performance opportunities throughout the year such as the Nativity and Christmas Services, assemblies, parish celebrations, instrumental performances, and Year 6 end of year production. Each year children showcase their instrumental skills in a violin concert for parents and friends of the school. Every child has the opportunity to participate in a school performance throughout the year.

We aim to expose the children to a wide variety of musical experiences, and this includes trips to the Bridgewater Hall or live theatre events.

In the future

This is about what the school is planning for subsequent years.

Areas for development:

- To vary the instrumental offer each year so that children have the opportunity to learn a variety of instruments throughout their primary years.
- To develop opportunities for extra curricular musical tuition throughout the school.
- To deliver staff training to support with supplementary listening skills and composition teaching.
